Complaints about Activities or Pollution in your Watershed or Aquifer

A proactive approach to maintaining good water quality is to review the source water protection document found on this website and follow its instructions. Source protection is a foundational piece of good environmental stewardship; it can also help to maintain the sustainability of your water supply for future generations.

Occasionally, there are activities in the watershed that are detrimental to the environment and/or to your water quality. Address these issues by carefully documenting the issue and filing a complaint with the appropriate agency, listed below, that can hopefully address the problem. <u>Do not intervene if you see an illegal activity. Just observe and report.</u>

Below are some helpful links to the agencies that govern the practices in our watersheds or provide assistance and complaint follow up:

Forest Harvesting and Cattle Management on Crown Lands:

 Forest Practices Branch: The Forest Practices Board serves the public interest as the independent watchdog for sound forest and range practices in BC. For water suppliers who are concerned about road building, cut plans, post cut recovery or cattle management, we suggest talking to the logging company or rancher first. If you are not satisfied with the response, the BC Forest Practice could be helpful in informing you on best practices for those activities. The BC Forest Practices Branch also has the ability to audit the practices of those industries.
